

Title I schools are required to:

- Develop jointly with parents a written Parent Involvement Plan.
- Hold an annual meeting to inform parents of the school's participation in the Title I program and their rights to be involved in school, and to explain the requirements of Title I.
- Develop jointly with parents a School-Parent-Student Compact. The compact must state how parents, the entire school, staff and students will share in the responsibility for improved student achievement and must be discussed during a parent/teacher conference.
- Provide staff training and materials to help parents work with their children.
- Provide timely information to parents about the Title I program and offer flexible meeting times.
- Provide (if requested) opportunities for regular meetings to allow parents to participate (as appropriate) in decisions about their child's education and respond to suggestions.
- Ensure that information sent to parents is in a format and language to the extent practicable, that parents can understand.
- Coordinate with other agencies.

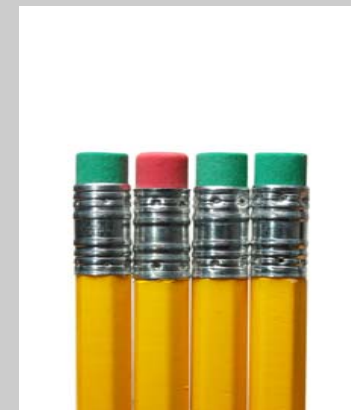

What Is Title I?

Title I is a federal funded program available to schools with a high percentage of students eligible for free and reduced lunch. These funds are above and beyond the district's funds given to schools and are to be used to enhance student achievement. In Volusia County, Title I serves 37 elementary, 14 alternative, 10 middle and 12 non-public schools.

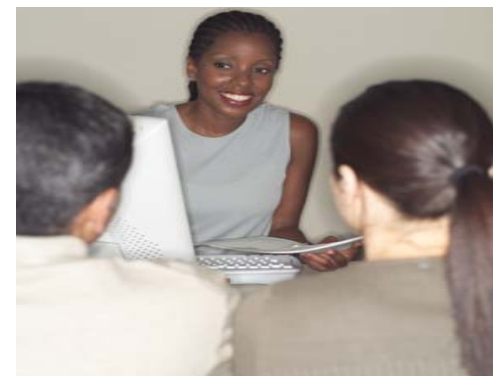
